Low-Wage Employees

The **minimum wage** in New Brunswick is **\$15.65**. The **living wage** is **\$24.62**.



*A living wage is the hourly rate a household (with full-time working parents and two children, aged 2 and 7) would require to satisfy basic needs and live with dignity while enjoying a decent quality of life.

45% of employees in New Brunswick earned less than the provincial living wage of \$24.62 in 2024.

Who are Low-Wage Employees?



In New Brunswick, the majority of employees earning less than the living wage are not students, and are 20 or older. Additionally, most are employed in permanent and/or full-time positions.

89% aged 15 to 64 are **not students**.

89% are **20 or older**.

53% are **Women+**.

55% work at firms with **100 or more employees**.

75% are **full-time employees**.

82% are **permanent employees**.

NEET Youth

13% of New Brunswick youth (15-29) were not in employment, education, or training in 2024.

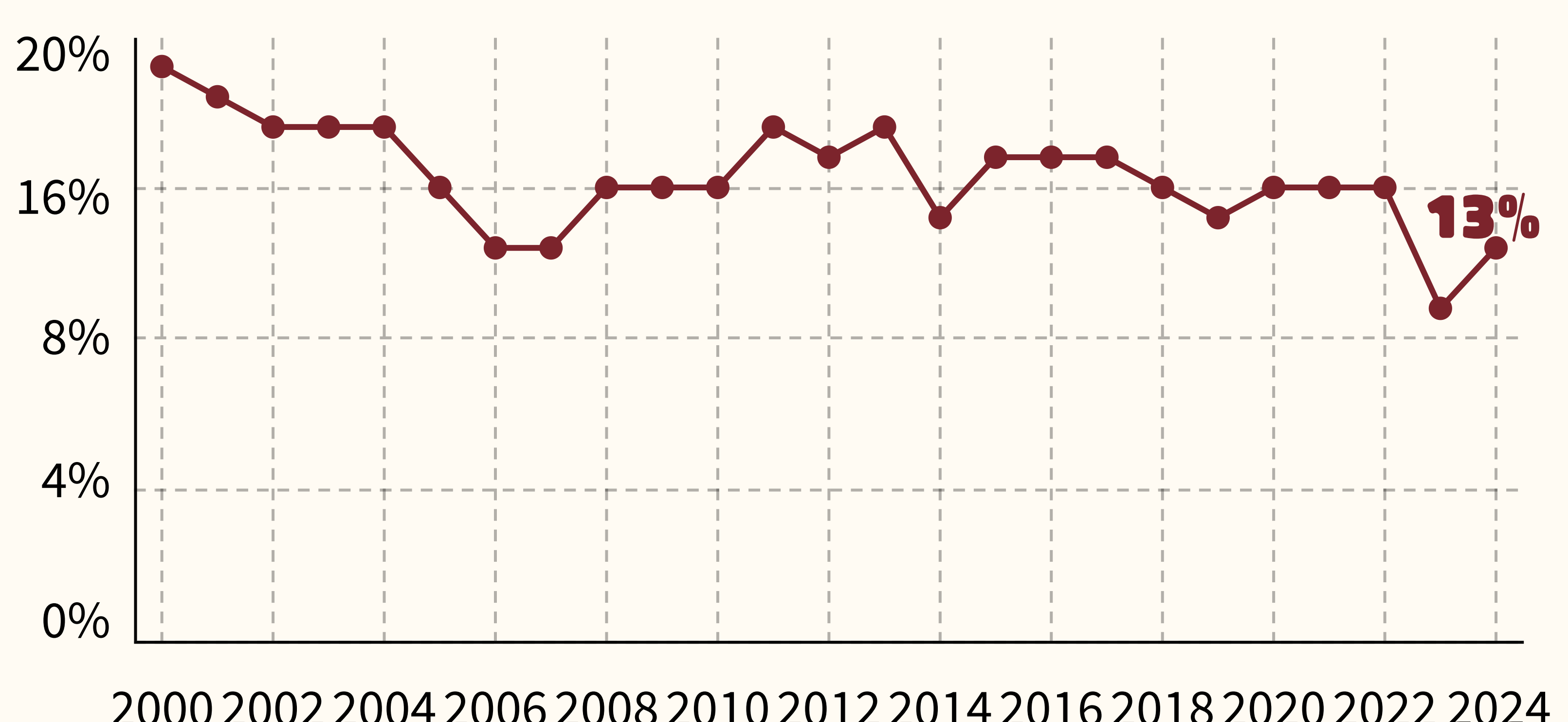
NEET stands for "**not in employment, education or training**."



*NEET youth (typically aged 15 to 29) are not enrolled in school or educational programs, not working, and not participating in any job training. NEET is an indicator of youth who may be at risk of social exclusion.

The prevalence of NEET youth (15-29) was the lowest in 2023.



Note About Data:

This analysis estimates the percentage of low-wage employees in New Brunswick earning under \$24.62/hour (46%), based on 2024 Labour Force Survey (LFS) Public Use Microdata Files. Self-employed, unpaid family workers, and others not classified as employees are not included in this calculation, since the LFS only collects hourly earnings data for wage- and salary-paid employees. The estimation refers to employees people who earn regular wages for their work.

For the NEET youth data, only the first three months of the year are included, following Statistics Canada's standard. As a result, the impact of COVID-19 may not be fully captured in the data.
